## What is the Speak out. Stay safe. programme?

Speak out. Stay safe. materials for Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) schools will help your child understand what abuse is and provide them with strategies to keep themselves safe.

Developed jointly by the NSPCC and Image in Action, the six-session programme has been designed to be delivered in partnership with NSPCC staff. We have studied the content of the materials and are confident that they are appropriate for our children.

## Talking about the Underwear Rule with your children

The NSPCC's work in schools will help encourage conversations about staying safe – and they have a number of child-friendly materials to help you carry on the conversation afterwards. That includes 'The Underwear Rule', a simple way for parents to help keep children safe from sexual abuse – without using scary words or even mentioning sex.
