OXENBURY—THE MAGIC TRAIN RIDE

In Term 1, we read a story called "The Magic Train Ride".

Each week we stopped at one of the "magic stops" to play. We stopped at the "magic wood", where we blew lots of bubbles, made bubble paint pictures and went to the sensory garden. We stopped at "the jungle", where we met lots of jungle animals, made big animal footprints and sang songs. We stopped in "outer space", where we made huge star pictures and went to the dark sensory room. Finally, we went to "cake land", where we made lots of cakes and puddings and decorated a giant cupcake together!

We all learned the "Magic Train Ride" song too!



OXENBURY—FUN WITH COLOUR



This term we have been learning about colour.

We have had a different colour each week to learn about through lots of exciting activities. For red we painted pasta red and tasted tomatoes. For yellow we counted yellow ducks For pink we made and tasted bananas. some strawberry angel delight and painted pigs. For green we counted frogs, tasted cucumber and visited the sensory garden, and for orange we made pumpkin and orange prints. We also use the week day wheel to learn about colours. We now know all the Makaton signs for the colours of the rainbow. Each week the photos taken in our colour sessions have been put up in the corridor to make a huge rainbow display.

ANDREAE—ME AND MY FEELINGS

We had a great start to the year. In term 1 we looked at "Me and My Feelings", exploring how we feel and how feelings are expressed.

During PE we moved our bodies in a variety of ways. We then looked at sad and happy flashcards to help us identify feelings and matched them to different music and movements.

During our expressive arts afternoons we used different body parts to create pictures, experience a variety of textures, trying to express how they make us feel. We tried lots of different foods some of which we were not so keen on!! We also all enjoyed joining in with a variety of role play themes; dressing up, looking after the dolls and hiding in tents and boxes.

We also worked very hard around communicating how we are feeling. Angie our speech and language assistant has helped us all with a choosing board that has different feelings for us to point to during our afternoon Circle Times.



ANDREAE—LIGHT AND DARK

This has been an exciting term exploring Light and Dark, looking at sources of light and what we can see in the light and the dark.

Miss Thomas's favourite activity has been taking groups into the sensory room using torches and glow sticks to explore. Then on the wall creating shadow puppets.

The children all loved our stories focusing on the dark. We have read and experienced 'Whatever Next', 'The owl that's scared of the dark' and 'Owl Babies'. We used these stories to then create beautiful art work from messy bubble wrap firework pictures and fluffy owls to big papier mache light bulbs. We then used these pieces of artwork to create two brilliant displays.

At the end of the term we have also spent a lot of time practising for our special Christmas production. We Three Kings (well it was ten actually!!) all played their parts and were little super stars.



ROSEN—MAKING MASKS



Rosen class have been learning about 'Ourselves'. For our Design and Technology work in Term 1, we learned about making masks. We talked about what masks are and when they are used. The children had fun trying different masks on and acting in role! They then made their own masks - some of them are very creative (and sparkly!) The children modelled their own masks for photos and then made a matching photo frame that is being displayed alongside their mask in the Key Stage One cabinet in the entrance area of the school. Come along and see them, we are very proud of ourselves!

ROSEN—THE GREAT BRITISH BAKE OFF!

In preparation for the Primary Christmas Production, where Rosen class acted out scenes from 'The Great British Bake Off', we turned our role play area into a bakery/cafe. We made our own play produce to 'sell', including cookies, cupcakes, jam tarts, buns and loaves of bread. We also made some of the 'real things' in our cooking lessons... they were yummy! The children enjoyed playing and acting out scenarios that happen in a bakery/

cafe. As a result of this, communication and language have really developed for many of our class this term, as well as imaginative play. We hope you enjoyed our performance in the Primary Christmas Production and recognised our very own Mary Berry and Paul Hollywood!





HARGREAVES—DOING THEIR BEST



Hargreaves did an assembly to all Primary pupils about `doing our best`. Each pupil was able to show what they have tried their best on this term. Gurshan has tried his best while experimenting with finger paints; one student has done his best in maths during which he completed several sudoku puzzles; Leo has done his best during literacy working on his sounds and blending; Auron has done his best to settle into a new class which he has accomplished; Hafsah has been trying her best during rebound sessions; Brandon has been doing his best to learn to write his name; Moya has been doing her best to complete her OT tasks; another student has done her best to make circular marks on paper with a range of tools; Tyler has been doing his best to stay on task during maths; and Liam has done his best while learning about electricity.

Hargreaves class are continuing to try their best with all activities and are succeeding - well done Hargreaves!



HARGREAVES-DIWALI, THE FESTIVAL OF LIGHT

In term two Hargreaves class learned about Diwali, the Hindu festival of lights. We looked at why and how people may celebrate Diwali and made our own religious decorations. The pupils in had Mendhi Hargreaves on patterns drawn their hands with henna and then drew their own patterns on hand templates using photographs as a reference. Hindu's light divas to light the way for Rama and Sita, and the pupils in Hargreaves made their own divas which are currently on display in the entrance.

Once we had looked at the festival of lights we moved on to the topic of shadow. The pupils got to experience what it is like to live in the dark using our dark den. We used torches to show how light travels and how shadows are made, we were able to use this knowledge to make silhouettes of the pupils in Hargreaves.







DONALDSON—AT THE LOOK OUT

As part of our science topic this term we went on a trip to 'The Look Out Discovery Centre'. The children really enjoyed exploring all of the different zones and taking part in the interactive science activities.

In the light and colour zone we explored how shadows are made and followed the colour patterns. One student loved making the steam swirl in the tunnel, Ethan made the sounds change by moving on the coloured steps and Maisie and Bobby enjoyed changing the light and watching its effect in the two way mirror.

The water zone was enjoyed by everyone, we changed the flow of the water and also tested which items sank and which floated. We used different equipment to splash in the water and explored the different uses of water. Harry and Zayn both loved the water tube and watched as their friends made the water swirl.

The forces and movement zone was lots of fun. We took part in lots of fun experiments, one student loved making the hot air balloon take off and Liam really enjoyed the marble run. In the body and perception zone we looked at different body parts and learnt about healthy eating.

In the build- it zone we all dressed up as builders with high visibility jackets and hard hats. We looked at the plans and used the trucks to move the bricks around. Alex and Reuben worked together to move the bricks on the conveyer belt and we built parts of the house, - it looked great!

After lunch and a play in the park we went to the woodland zone. We all loved our walk into the woodland and explored the wood huts, we looked at the different trees and kept an eye out for animals. We ended up seeing some squirrels, birds, an ape and a bear! (luckily the ape and the bear were not real!).

We had a fun packed day and learnt lots of new things. Here are some photos and we have lots more photos of our trip on display in school.

BROWNE-PRESENT FANTASTIC MR FOX



In Term 1 we read *Fantastic Mr Fox* by Roald Dahl. We have really enjoyed the story, and for our assembly we did some role play. Farmers Boggis, Bunce and Bean were digging down to reach the foxes, while the foxes had to work together to dig to safety! We acted out digging a long tunnel, with the farmers chasing us. We then shared our ideas on how to solve problems by working together.







In cooking, Browne class have been busy baking biscuits. They particularly enjoyed the shared tasting and smelling sessions the following day!

We also enjoyed our history topic on World War Two. We looked at some objects from the past and learned about evacuation and rationing, and then we went on our own evacuee experience to Marlow on the train!



BROWNE—FOCUS ON MONEY AND ELECTRICITY

This term, we have focused on learning about money and coin value in maths. Some of us have been using coins to practise counting skills, whilst others loved the role play shopping activities, buying items of food and working out how to pay for them and find the correct change. We have learnt about electricity in Science. We had lots of fun operating electrical devices with switches and making simple circuits.



KING-SMITH—ENJOYING ALL LESSONS!!

We had a very busy first term in King-Smith, learning about Time and Shapes in Maths. We began by searching the school and grounds for shapes. We discovered a shape house outside our door and enjoyed investigating the different sizes and shapes. We began "Read Write Inc" in our English lessons; this intensive phonic based scheme has had a huge impact in our classroom with many of the pupils now stating that English is their favourite lesson!

Through our PSHE lessons, we have studied the celebrations of different cultures. The pupils loved tasting the various celebratory foods and re-creating the celebrations through drama. The favourite lesson had to be the recreation of the Holi festival were all pupils covered up in art overalls then took part in a giant paint throwing celebration. We have also been studying World War 2, and this topic has been a favourite with all the pupils, many of whom have found out about relatives who served the war effort. We looked at the impacts the war had at home, with children being evacuated and the effects of rationing. The pupils recreated an evacuation and packed their bags with special belongings, and set off for the train station. There they caught the train to Marlow and enjoyed a picnic in the park.









KING-SMITH-CHRISTMAS TREAT AT TVAP



The final part of our term in King-Smith has been filled with Christmas fun! The children have loved decorating our classroom, baking festive cakes and writing their lists to Father Christmas. They have been practising hard for the Christmas show and I am proud to say that all the members of the class can perform a terrifying Hakka!

We have been working so hard on our listening skills. The children lined up on the playground as soon as they were asked, and as a reward, were given the treat of having a day at TVAP. A fantastic fun filled day for all so close to Christmas, and all the children loved their day out!



CHILD—EVACUATE TO MARLOW!

In Term 1 we learned all about World War II in our History lessons. We explored different artefacts and photographs as well as videos documenting the World War II, particularly the Evacuation, and what the children of the time had to experience.

We spent an afternoon role playing an Evacuation – the children packed their suitcases, filled with their handmade ration books, passports and gas masks – said goodbye to their families and got the train to their new homes in order to be safe. The pupils all got involved and discussed how the children of the time may have felt.



The following week the pupils in Child class joined King-Smith and Browne classes to re-enact an Evacuation from Manor Green School. We arrived at the train station and the pupils all sang songs together before getting the train from Maidenhead to Marlow. Upon arrival the pupils sat together in the park eating their "rations" (packed lunches) before enjoying some time playing together in the park. The pupils enjoyed their time on the train and mixing with other classes. We pretended to wave goodbye through the windows as we took off to our "unknown destination"!

CHILD—WHAT DOES THE FOX SAY???

In Child Class we have had lots of fun over the Christmas period. The pupils in particular enjoyed choosing "Ylvis -What does the fox say?" as their song of choice! After lots of practising and team work they had mastered the dance routine as well as the lyrics. Amongst all this, Child class thought it would be a great idea to make their own fox – on stage! They have had so much fun getting messy and creative.

The children have done so well learning all the different Makaton signs for the animals, choosing and wearing their costumes, showing off their dance moves and using their best singing voices. Most importantly, they have all worked together and given each support other throughout their performances!



KEY STAGE TWO-TAG RUGBY

BLYTON—EARTH AND BEYOND

Term two in Blyton has been about 'Earth and Beyond'.

To best understand the sun and its effects on Earth we have been reading 'Night Monkey, Day Monkey' which led us onto all sorts of interesting facts about the things that we can see, hear and do at night verses the day – for example, we decided that watching fireworks is best done at night! It also encouraged us to think about opposites. In Maths we packed shopping bags to distinguish heavy from light, full from empty and big from small and in Science we looked at shadows and learnt about the effects of blocking light to make darkness. We then went on to read 'Owl Babies' as we explored the emotions of being in the dark and being alone, we also thought about all of the nocturnal animals that we might see if we were awake at night and what features they have to help them survive in the dark and cold.

Amongst all of this we have been very excited about preparing for Christmas. Our class assembly fell on December 2nd which allowed us to show off our Christmas tree. We also learnt a song all about advent and played the tune live on the glockenspiels!

The pantomime runs at South Hill Park, Bracknell, until the beginning of January and is great fun for all the family and highly recommended by Manor Green students.



DAHL-GARDENING AND COOKING

The first term back after an extended summer holiday saw Dahl class diving straight into the "swishwiffling" world of Roald Dahl. We visited the Roald Dahl Museum in Buckinghamshire and were able to take inspiration from his and other authors' work. His writing chair was available to try out and proved a hit with most of the children, as did the gift shop. Wonka bars sold out quicker than "Golden Tickets"!

We also took up the challenge of clearing some of the allotment area ready for re-planting.

We are hoping to have an early crop of broad beans, carrots and rocket.

Continuing with the vegetable theme we have been cooking with vegetables and made a tomato and basil ragu reduction to use as a pizza sauce. The children have also planned their own two course meal using the skills learnt this term with great success.

In English our focus has been reading for pleasure and the children have found: poems, song lyrics, reviews and books they liked from various sources including a trip to Maidenhead library.

It's been a good half term with some great learning happening. We're sure this will continue into Term Two.





DAHL-KEEPING YOU UPDATED

This term always seems to fly by, as everyone is building up to the festive season. We have been very focused on our academic learning this term and have covered some very tricky maths, even venturing into averages and analysing the works of The Beatles. Our writing this term has been all about leisure and how tourists

are persuaded to visit different attractions. We visited Windsor Leisure Pool, looked at different castles around the United Kingdom and even investigated the use of formal language when wishing to hire a bouncy castle.

We continue to tend to four plots in the allotment area which have already been planted with broad beans, rocket and carrots. The latter have been thinned and are expected to give a bumper crop in late spring. We have some more plants that need to be sown indoors after the Christmas break but the earliest seeds to be planted outside are the oriental salad leaves and they go out in March.

Our science has been focused on materials from our earth and our environment. We have learnt about atoms, elements and compounds. We have then used this knowledge to mix two elements together and make a new compound and turn one compound into a different one by using acid and salt. We also looked at photosynthesis and saw which elements and compounds were created through photosynthesis.

In design and technology we have been using our metal work skills to create some Christmas gifts. Because of this we can't say much more, else it might spoil the surprise. What can be said is that everyone has produced some excellent pieces of work and we're sure they will be treasured possessions for years to come.

The class had a problem solving morning, towards the end of term and had to work as team

to produce a roller coaster for a marble and a protective case for an egg. We wish you all a happy, healthy festive time and look forward to more learning in the New Year.

Hopgood class have been busy this term with their Life Skills and Enterprise Studies. Every Monday Hopgood class head off to Maidenhead town centre/ High Wycombe as part of their life skills' lesson. When shopping, students use their knowledge of money and their keen eye to purchase various art and craft materials. Once back at school, students get busy making up their

craft products, packaging and labelling. The finished products are then sold to staff, parents and students every Friday morning as part of their Enterprise learning. This term the theme for the Enterprise lessons has been Christmas decorations.



MANOR GREEN WORK EXPERIENCE PROJECT

The objective of the project is to help prepare students for working life after they leave Manor Green School. I am focusing on a group of Key Stage Five pupils in Lee Class to identify, source and support employment opportunities during the year (and relevant courses) so that these lead to **real** employment opportunities in the future. These students are being given support to develop a vocational plan, try a range of work experience opportunities to **match** their skills/ aspirations and carry out independent travel skills where relevant. The work experience sessions themselves are supported by me in the work place so students learn what a job really involves, how to behave and how to develop.

In reality it was a very busy summer break for many of the students who continued their work experience placements through the holiday. Over and above this several attended a Kitchen Taster day at the Rendezvous Cafe which incorporated some Food Hygiene training: two students had a day's paid work delivering leaflets: one of our students was paid for some seasonal work at her work experience placement.

The new term brought us some new students and a couple of these students are already out on work placements in a variety of roles namely admin, a local cafe and volunteering as a swimming coach's assistant. Students from last year continue developing in some of the positions started towards the end of the last academic year, including one new position as a garden centre assistant for two days per week. One other student has now started her paid part time position with the Toffee Group as a peer mentor.

Over and above this, one student is currently attending a hairdressing course and three other students, a travel training course. We have also visited a major IT company in Bracknell and teamed up with an international pharmaceutical company on their volunteering day at Longridge in Marlow.

Work experience placements are now being tracked and recorded in such a way that they can be reflected upon back in the classroom and used as evidence towards gaining an accreditation - the ASDAN Employability, Learning through Work Experience module at Entry Level One. I am in the process of developing our own travel training course which will incorporate personalised student trips – this will start next term.
