ROSEN-CREATE THEIR OWN GARDEN CENTRE

We learnt about seeds and used them to make bird feeders to put on the trees outside our classroom. Hopefully we will get to see the birds eating them soon.

We also learnt that we must take care of plants and that we get many different foods from them - we m a d e s o m e yummy vegetable soup using foods from plants.

Rosen class did an assembly about growing plants and have made a display outside our classroom, to share lots of our hard work.











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HARGREAVES—LOOK AT FORCES



In term three Hargreaves worked on the topic 'Forces'. All of the pupils used forces in everyday activities such as pushing the swings, pulling open gates and doors, and even playing tug of war! Some of our pupils collected data regarding how forces are used to change the shape of objects, for example play dough can be pushed, pulled, stretched, twisted and bent into a whole variety of shapes. We learnt about how the strength of forces can be changed to get different results, so if you push a toy car hard it will travel further than if you only push it softly.

As well as learning all about forces, Hargreaves class looked at the Chinese New Year, and learnt that this year is the Year of the Horse. We all looked at the chart to find out our Chinese Zodiac Sign and to find out what the Chinese believe this says about person's character. We read that through the story of how the years were named and how the clever rat managed to win the race.

HARGREAVES— PLANTS AND ANIMALS



In term four Hargreaves worked on the topic **`plants and animals in our local environment`**. We looked at the different parts of a plant and discussed their uses. We did an experiment to find out what plants need to grow by studying four broad beans growing in different conditions, and we made predictions and conclusions. One of the beans was given light, water and oxygen, one had water and oxygen, one had light and oxygen and one had light and water. We found that the bean that had light, water and oxygen grew the biggest and strongest. In addition, each pupil grew their own sunflower in a can which they took home for the Easter Holiday.

We also explored different habitats throughout the school, starting in our sensory garden, where we found several fragrant plants such as mint and rosemary, and a few mini beasts such as spiders, caterpillars and ladybirds. Next we looked at our garden and pond area, we searched for mini beasts, pictures of which you can see here.



DONALDSON-WE CAN SCULPT!

In Donaldson Class our art topic during term 3 was sculpture.

We looked at different examples of s c u l p t u r e s b y different artists on the internet and in books in the library.

We then went on a walk around school find different to sculptures, there were lots of things to look at in the sensory garden and we enjoyed seeing the work of the older pupils in the art room.

We practised our very own model making by using play dough, making sure we tried out lots of different ideas, tools and techniques using some of our favourite things as a starting point.










DONALDSON—WE CAN SCULPT! CONT.


DONALDSON—SEE THE GRUFFALO LIVE!

CHILD—CELEBRATE CHINESE NEW YEAR



On Tuesday 11th of March Shakespeare class went to visit Wellington Country Park, to look at 3D shape in the environment. The students had the opportunity to explore the environment, allowing them to realise that everything is made up of different 3D shapes. We first stopped off at the adventure playground, where the students explored the area by climbing, sliding and jumping off of the equipment, allowing them to see the shapes from different angles. Nathan plucked up the courage to go on the zip wire ... he only did this once!!!

As we were wandering to the Animal Farm, Nathan got distracted by the miniature train and was very excited when Miss Hooper agreed to the class having a ride. Nathan was first to jump on, shortly followed by George, Charlie and Scott. The class got to experience independent travel as they all went on the train without any staff, but were closely watched by us all! They all behaved impeccably and were very excited when they returned back to the station to be greeted by us all. SHAKESPEARE—STUDY 3D SHAPES CONT.




HANDLER—FOIL SCULPTURES

In Term 4 Handler class have been busy during Art lessons making sculptures of different professions in action.

pupils The used cardboard and sticky tape to create their figures, which they based o n photographs of professional people in different poses. They then covered the figures in tin foil to create these wonderful metallic sculptures, which include a pop star, tennis player, policeman, judo lollipop instructor, lady and a footballer.

They are now on display in Handler class and have been admired by many people.



ROWLING—BUSY BUSY BUSY!!

Another busy term for Rowling class!

Students studied the patterns of chemical changes. This involved lots of practical investigations, predicting results then carrying out the investigation to obtain their evidence. We investigated the effect of temperature on materials by dissolving a jelly cube first in cold water, then in hot water. We predicted and observed the change that would occur.

Rowling Class also investigated reversible and irreversible changes. Here we used heat to melt a solid chocolate into a liquid. Students spread the liquid chocolate over a biscuit, and then predicted that by placing it in the fridge, the chocolate would become solid again. Hot melted chocolate was placed in the fridge to cool and solidify.

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
HOPGOOD—TAKE CARE OF THEIR TEETH
