To get fully into the theme of science we visited the Lookout Discovery Centre in Bracknell, where we experienced the hands on science exhibits, had fun in the playground and took a walk through the woodland area collecting pine cones.





This term in Oxenbury class we have been getting involved in activities around the topic of fairy tales. During this topic we have been creative in our cooking sessions making our own gingerbread men, making sweetie houses and jam sandwiches. Each week we used our imagination to bring each fairy tale to life, in the form of a sensory story.

While others had a fantastic day at the Look Out! The pupils saw floating orbs, huge water vortexes, hot air balloons and much, much more. All experiments were easily accessable to the pupils which meant each child could take control over their own learning. We then went on a big nature walk through the forest where

we hunted for animals and plants. We saw plenty of these and were able to hide inside a wooden den we found in the woodland. The pupils really enjoyed this day and as we were leaving I was told by one pupil 'I love the Lookout'.

You would think that two trips would be enough excitement but we had even more to look forward to throughout the week with visits from Yucky You and Mad Science teaching us how our bodies work, and exciting experiments. We were able to use pedal planes (replica war planes) to zoom about the halls and we also sat in a real plane outside the school, not to mention visits from animals and a wonderful interactive space adventure.

A lovely final term to the year, we have been learning about animals and their life cycles. In order to help us understand this topic we were lucky enough to visit Odds Farm Park. 




We also became pilots for the day – before blasting off into outer space!

For our science fair experiment Blyton class made and demonstrated how to make homemade lava lamps in a variety of colours.











BLYTON—SPORTS DAY

The children used their own knowledge and the experience gained from the trip to make a class display based on the theme "Life at the Beach".




The students listened attentively to the presentations and responded well to questions they were asked. They particularly enjoyed the practical aspects of the visits, like trying on jackets and helmets and spending time sitting inside the fire engine proved particularly popular.

DAHL—GREAT COMPOSERS

We have really enjoyed Music this term. At the start of the each lesson, Dahl class were asked to pick musical instruments from a table where several had been placed and then asked to sit in a circle. At first they were asked to perform simple rhythms consisting of three consecutive beats of the same tempo; they were then asked to the change the instruments they were using. We tried playing the instruments in different ways and then followed instructions to play quickly and slowly, loudly and softly.

Later in the term, we used a couple of music programs that allowed the students to compose a piece of music with minimal adult support. One of the programs allowed students to layer a piece of music by adding different rhythms, beats and lyrics, one by one, to create a song composed by the entire class. The students were asked to add to the music taking it in turns and they did very well and were able to this remember the order that they had been put in. As a class, we also made our own music video, individually adding lyrics and sounds to create the video and song. We really enjoyed listening and dancing to the music we produced.



DAHL—LEARN ABOUT FORGIVENESS



This term we have been working on expressing our feelings, fears and forgiveness.

We have explored the use of facial expressions and body language to express our feelings and developed a nunderstanding that not everyone feels the same.



As a class, we built up portfolios on our likes and dislikes and discussed them together, finding out that some people like different things to others. We really enjoyed doing a role-play on 'forgiveness' and made posters to understand when we can forgive.



This term we also celebrated the signing of the Magna Carta, we linked this to our Social Skills work and made our own coat of arms using our likes and our names. We then made scrolls using the schools' golden rules and signed them using feather quills we had made.

ROWLING—GOOD ENOUGH TO EAT!

Rowling Class studied the fairy tale Hansel and Gretel.

In Art, we coloured a house, then added lots of delicious sweets to make it into the house like the one in the story. Our houses looked good enough to eat when we had finished them!




ROWLING—DESIGN TECHNOLOGY

In Design and Technology, we had lots of fun making papier mache penguins.


We also made some wooden jigsaw puzzles, linked to the story
The Tiger Who Came To Tea.


First we drew and painted our designs onto the wood, then Gary helped us to cut our pictures up into jigsaw pieces.

Towards the end of Term 6, Walliams class took a trip to Runnymede to the site of the sealing of the Magna Carta. The pupils had already learned about the democratic legacy of this important document during the Magna Carta anniversary week in June. It was fantastic to visit the actual place where it was historically sealed by King John 800 years ago.

Nearby we saw a piece of artwork called The Jurors – which consists of 12 bronze chairs placed in a circle around an invisible table. Each throne has been carved and embossed with images and symbols, all documenting the struggle for freedom and equal rights. It is designed to provoke thought and discussion on how the Magna Carta still affects us all now. The pupils all thought that the chairs were a fantastic and striking work of art, but also that the images carved on them are important to keep the fight for equality and justice alive. We were spoiled by the beautiful weather that day, so the class then enjoyed a walk by the river to feed the ducks, and lastly a stop at a local restaurant for a hearty lunch. A truly brilliant day for all, and a fitting way to say goodbye to our year in Walliams class.



LEE—STUDY STREET ART


Lee students have been studying **Street Art** as their Enrichment / Art project this term, and have been looking at a variety of mediums, including graffiti, performance and song.

SHAKESPEARE—GET DOWN WITH THE WILDLIFE

Last month Shakespeare went to visit Dinton Pastures.

Dinton Pastures Country Park was opened to the public in 1979 after 14 years of gravel extraction on a site which was previously farmland. Today the park is enjoyed by several hundred thousand visitors annually and is a haven for wildlife.

As the water areas were created, wildlife and visitors moved in. Wintering wildfowl like wigeon, pochard and goldeneye soon found the lakes as well as familiar species like swans, coots, mallards and gulls. Nightingales found places to nest in the scrub areas and dragonfly species moved into the

wetlands.

The park has a significant number of the latter with 18 species present on site out of a British total of 42 species. Rarer birds started to arrive like bitterns and smew on Lavell's Lake and great crested newts have been found in the ponds.



Over 5,000 school children visit the site annually to learn about their environment. Regular Countryside Events are organised throughout the year on everything from bat and bird walks to basket making and star watching as well as bigger 'fun days' for families, where there are up to 3,000 people.

The Countryside Service has recently updated the play area. New wildlife trails were opened last year and electric buggies are now available for disabled visitors to hire free of charge.

This was a fantastic place for the students to explore a naturally created play area and observe the general wildlife. We enjoyed a delicious lunch in the café and a sneaky ice cream just before coming home.

SHAKESPEARE -SPORT FOR ALL



The benefits of PE are clear for students; exercise, as we know, is good for us, helping to develop co-ordination, control and movement, motor skills and improving fitness levels in general. Aside from physical factors, PE is also invaluable for teaching students how to work individually or as part of a team, developing qualities of fairness, dedication, self-expression and building confidence and self-esteem. These are all qualities that we would like our children to develop and they can be particularly important for SEN pupils, but, of all the subjects taught in school, PE can often be the most challenging for these vulnerable young people. A subject that is traditionally

about athleticism, and in which competition is a large factor, is one which learners with additional needs or disabilities can find isolating. With this in mind the staff work really hard to provide activities which are accessible to all students. We had great fun on this sunny day with both the students and some of the parents. As you can see, a good time was had by all.



JOB COACH

Hello again everyone – this academic year I have been working with a group of Key Stage 5 individuals in Lee Class to identify, source and support employment opportunities during the year, so that these lead to **real** employment opportunities in the future.

Here are the headlines for this year:

- Several students have been paid for work varying from delivering leaflets, working in a cafe and sitting on an Interview panel.
- One student is working part time 2 days per week in his dream job with a building contractor, as an Assistant to the Tradesmen.
- There are currently 5 work trials going on in a range of part time jobs in retail and a garden centre.
- Work placements continue to up-skill other students to allow them to experience firsthand what is actually involved in a job. The work placements focus on learning the necessary skills to get part time paid work whilst still at school or college. These include garden centre, library, cafe and retail settings.
- One student who left Manor Green School in April last year has now successfully completed her level 2 Health & Social Care Apprenticeship and secured a permanent post as a Lunchtime Support Worker at Manor Green School.

In our search to investigate what jobs are out there and what is actually involved in them last October, together with some students from KS4, we visited a local employer – Clean Linen - to tour their office and plant site in Maidenhead and we have just completed a tour of the Royal Berkshire Hospital looking at the different types of jobs their 5000 employees are engaged in – this tied in nicely to the Health & Social Care pathway option students are currently studying.
